Some of you might have been wondering what's happening with the bridge and we're pleased to say we've made some progress. CDD CC & PBAG had a meeting with the council on 21st Jan and as we didn't get through all our points, reconvened on 4th Feb.

The meetings were chaired by Alan Wood, the Director of Infrastructure Services and Donald Macpherson, Head of Structures was there too. A few of our local councillors attended (Cllr Wendy Agnew & Cllr Sarah Dickinson were at both meetings) and Cllr Peter Argyle attended as Chair of the Infrastructure Services Committee. We had representation from CDDCC (Mark Ansell) and PBAG (Alan Holmes and Anne Shearer).



You may recall that the Bridges Plan has £750,000 in it for Park Bridge in 2024 but not re-opening the bridge to traffic. We've been pushing for the basis of this decision, and it appears that it is not a final decision, just a recommendation by council officers based on the proximity of other bridges, Grade 1 listing, the design and its use. The future of the bridge has still to be considered by the Kincardine & Mearns Area Committee and we know that they

have already expressed a preference for the bridge to be re-opened to light vehicles. Our concern about the absence of any structural assessment of the bridge, determining its load-bearing capacity, has been heard by Alan Wood and he has undertaken to see if he can get an independent assessment carried out. This would be a major step forwards as currently we say the bridge could carry traffic and the council disagree. An independent assessment which is then independently verified will settle the matter. It may take some months to get this done but we are very pleased with this development after more than 2 years of pushing for it.

So, we're not there yet, but we are an awful lot closer than we were this time last year.

And huge thanks to all of you that sent emails and contacted Aberdeenshire Council because it's you in the community keeping the pressure on that's making this happen.

We have all waited in for a trade-person to arrive to fix the broken machine or a parcel to be delivered or for a phone call. Waiting can be hard, we are not used

Amen.


#### Lenten Cross






#### WITCHCRAFT IN SCOTLAND

It has been estimated that there were between four and six thousand witchcraft trials in Scotland, most of which were in the lowland areas of the country – like Aberdeenshire. This number is extremely high for such a small nation; with less than a quarter of England's population, Scotland had three times the number of trials.

One explanation that has been advanced is that King James the Sixth (later to become King James the First of England) believed he was the victim of witchcraft after having seen witchhunts on a visit he had made to Denmark. Upon returning to Scotland, James attended witch trials and wrote a book on the subject. After it was published it sparked what became known as The Great Scottish Witch Hunt of 1597. This was the second national witch hunt in Scotland, with a further three to follow, the last in 1661. In each of these hunts, many hundreds of people, mostly – but not exclusively – women, were accused of witchcraft and of talking to the devil. Often the charges against the women were, by today's standards, shocking — such as a woman healing someone when they were sick, the accusers assuming if she could heal, she could also harm. The last witch to be tried and executed in Scotland was Janet Horne, in 1727, and a small stone marks the spot in the Sutherland town of Dornoch where she was tarred, placed in a barrel, and burnt.



Some of the factors which led to the torturing and death of so many women have been ascribed to a potent mix of the Protestant religion, strict morality, and ingrained misogyny of local kirk sessions – a ruling body of mainly male elders – endeavouring to stamp out what they saw as corrupting behaviour. But women were also targeted because they were vulnerable, some of them owned land that others – usually men – wanted access to or they were unmarried or

widowed. Between the first execution in 1479 and the last in 1727, at least 2,500 women and men were killed and thousands more were tortured or put on trial. Scotland carried out five times more executions than the European average.

But another interpretation can be advanced. Evidence shows that witch-hunts took off only after the Reformation in 1517, following the rapid spread of Protestantism. As competing Catholic and Protestant churches vied to win over or retain their followers, they needed to make an impact – and the battleground they chose was the witch trials. The phenomenon reached its peak between 1555 and 1650, the years when competition for 'Christian consumers' reached its height. This may explain why Germany, heart of the Reformation, laid claim to nearly 40% of all witchcraft prosecutions in Europe. Scotland, where different strains of Protestantism were in competition, saw the second highest level of witch-hunts, with a total of 3,563 people tried.

It should be noted that John Knox who is frequently represented as the hero of the Scottish Reformation believed women were inferior to men and were capable only of domestic acts such as bearing children. He placed blame on the 'abominable empire of wicked women' for the trials and tribulations of the Reformation.

In Spain, Italy, Portugal, and Ireland – each of which remained Catholic strongholds after the Reformation, and which never saw any serious competition from Protestantism – collectively accounted for just 6% of Europeans tried for witchcraft.

Another factor may tentatively be advanced. From the 16<sup>th</sup> century onward the weather in Europe deteriorated – it became wetter and colder. This phenomenon came to be known as the Little Ice Age when villages experienced freak frosts, floods, hailstorms and plagues of mice and caterpillars. So, witch hunts not infrequently corresponded to ecological disasters and crop failures, along with the accompanying problems of famine, inflation, and disease. In such a situation, witches made a convenient scapegoat.

#### **Footnote**

Claire Mitchell, QC, is currently leading a Witches of Scotland campaign and is seeking a national apology and the creation of a monument dedicated to the many female victims of the witch hunts in Scotland (*The Guardian*, 19 December 2021). In the opinion of this writer, it is an apology which is long overdue.



#### Perfect Peonies by Susan Lindsay, Plant Area Manager, Drum Garden Centre

Someone at work today was asking me if it would be okay for them to move their herbaceous peonies from their garden to their daughter's garden as they had heard that they shouldn't be moved at all.

It's a myth!

There is no reason why you shouldn't move your peony. The prime time would be around October but no later than the end of March....do it now!!

Such a gorgeous plant, often their scented flowers are cut and used for vases indoors. These beautiful plants will give you colour from April through to June and maybe even slightly longer. Before moving remove any old material and debris from your peony. Try not to damage the roots in any way, lifting as much of these as you can, keep the new planting position away from large shrubs and trees so that your peony is not deprived of moisture.

Peonies do well in most soils but never let them dry out at all, especially if planted at the beginning of the year as opposed to the end. In wintertime the area needs to drain well as they



wouldn't like sitting in a soggy position. When planting be careful not to plant too deep as this will reduce the number of flowers you get, so keep the tips of the plant just under the soil and give it good all-round space to grow into.

In spring a feed with a fertiliser such as Growmore will suffice and remember and keep it watered through the summer months if required, they would hate to dry out. Use organic matter for mulching but keep away from the crown of the plant and not too deep. Enjoy!

If you are looking for some colour in the garden in the earlier part of the year look out for Forsythia Lynwood, Hamamelis, Ribes, Viburnum bodnantense Dawn and check out Salix gracilistyla Mount Aso to name but a few. A selection of these will carry you through to when your peonies will start bursting into flower.

#### Compass: setting the direction for 2022

Local medical charity, Camphill Wellbeing Trust (CWT) launched Compass in September 2020 to transform the former Waldorf School site on Craigton Road. The project has made great progress towards demonstrating practical solutions for healthy and sustainable lifestyles thanks to the support of our **local community**.

Compass has received a fantastic **2101 hours** of **volunteer support** which recently helped us plant 40 raspberry canes and clear space for fruit trees. In preparation for the next growing season, we are re-designing the layout of our **no-dig beds** to accommodate further fruit bushes and vegetable plants. These will increase the selection of organically grown produce that will be available to the local community through our **Produce Pop-Ups** later this year.



#### **Funding Success**

We are delighted to have secured funding from various sources to develop our outdoor garden areas for the local community. This

includes funds for a **composting toilet**, gardening equipment and 3-years costs for an outdoor areas manager. This places Compass in a strong position to support our volunteers with improved facilities onsite as they help develop the garden areas and get the project off to a great start for 2022! We have also been able to purchase an Avant Loader from Angus Chain Saws, which has already been put to good use for some of the heavier outdoor work.



#### **HOMEOWNERS – IMPORTANT NOTICE**

In February 2019 the Legislation relating to smoke detection in your home changed. All domestic properties in Durris/Drumoak could be affected.

You need to have the following: -

- One smoke alarm installed in the room most frequently used for general daytime living purposes.
  - One smoke alarm in every circulation space on each storey, such as hallway and landing.
    - One heat alarm installed in every kitchen.
    - All fire alarms are to be ceiling mounted and must be interlinked.
  - Carbon monoxide detectors are to be fitted where there are carbon fuelled appliances (such as boilers, fires, open fires, heaters, stoves, or a flue).

#### The Regulations come into effect in February 2022.



Given our poor portacabin at Crossroads had been out of use for nearly two years, it was looking a bit sorry for itself. It

needed a deep clean and new risk assessments put in place, to ensure we were Covid safe. Lynne leapt into action breathing a new lease of life into the premises. If anyone has been up to Crossroads recently you will notice our newly revamped outdoor area, which the toddlers simply love. We also extend our thanks to her family for helping to bring her vision to life!

An amazing donation of a playhouse from John Reid and a wealth of lovely toys, from the kind souls in our community, mean there is plenty for the children to explore and play with. This

We run a toddler group where an adult can stay and play with their little one/s. These sessions run twice a week on a Tuesday and Thursday from 9.30-1130 and are open to all aged 0 – preschool nursery age. They involve some informal play, an age-appropriate art and crafts session, singing and story time. The children are thriving and those accompanying them are benefitting from a cup of tea and a good chat.

We also run two creche sessions per week on a Wednesday and Friday where children aged 2 – pre-school nursery age, can attend unaccompanied for two hours. These sessions are a fantastic preparation for nursery. It has been so wonderful watching the little ones settle into these sessions and gain a little independence from their parents, something which is brand new for a lot of the children who have come into the world during the ongoing pandemic. #### Peterculter Medical Practice

Thank you to all our patients for continuing to follow the current guidance around Covid 19.

Some of you will already be aware that our receptionists have had a change in job title to Care Navigators; their job is unchanged, but we feel the new title better reflects what they actually do. They are trained to take information over the phone which helps our doctors/nurse practitioners ensure patients get help from the right person in the right timeframe. They follow protocols to direct people who would be best helped by different services to the correct care i.e., directing people with dental problems to a dentist and eye problems to an optician. They also have an important role 'behind the scenes' too with prescription requests, hospital letters etc. When they ask you for information or direct you to other services they are doing so on behalf of the doctors and according to practice protocols so please bear this in mind and be respectful of them as they carry out their job.

To free up our Care Navigators to help our more vulnerable patient groups, who cannot use online services, we would like to remind those who can and have medications on repeat prescription of 'Patient Access'. This service allows you to order repeat prescriptions online from the comfort of your own home 24/7 and the prescriptions are sent to your preferred local pharmacy ready for you to collect. Guidance on how to sign up is on our website. Please try to remember to order your medication (by phone or online) in plenty of time allowing a minimum of 2 days before you want to collect your medication. Unless truly urgent, prescription requests are not done same day. If you forget and run out remember that (under the urgent provision of repeat medication service) your pharmacy may be able to provide you with a supply of a medication from your repeat prescription list without a prescription from your GP.

Our practice pharmacy team has an important role in dealing with prescription requests, carrying out reviews with patients on regular medications and helping to look after our patients who need medications for conditions such as asthma and high blood pressure. We

have recently expanded the team and are delighted to have another pharmacist onboard. Kelly will join Valerie, Nicole and our pharmacy technician Lee-Anne in helping our patients to manage their medications.


