#### **Defibrillators Saving Lives: Our Community Enhanced with Four New Installations**

We are absolutely thrilled to share that we have successfully implemented four new defibrillators within our local community, which are located at the following locations:

Drumoak - Hair Hut

**Durris - Crossroads Nursery School** 

**Durris - Woodland Primary School** 

Park - Sunnyside Construction

Grampian Training Services have supplied each site with ZOLL AED Plus Defibrillators, which provide fully automated operation and give real time feedback to those assisting the patient through the process, including CPR technology analysis of the patient. We have also ensured that each unit is supplied with spare pads suitable for infants and a rescue ready pack which comes with the essentials (scissors, razor etc....) not standard with units supplied.

We would like to give a big thankyou to those above that have facilitated in hosting the defibs along with the Kincardineshire Development Partnership (KDP) who supported with the Meikle Carewe Wind Farm Community Fund and Aberdeenshire Council, in particular the Kincardine and Mearns Area Team for supporting the project with the necessary funding to purchase the units and for covering management fees.

Finally, we would like to thank Sunnyside Construction and Ener-G Services for providing labour and equipment free of charge for installing the units for the community.

As part of the delivery scope, Grampian Training Services have also included free awareness training for 6 people per unit. We will look to arrange dates in the calendar with a small holding fee which will be refunded on attendance on the night, so keep an eye out for these being shared on social media and will be on a first come first serve basis.

Wilma loves her garden where she still manages on the odd occasion to tell Louise and Moira the odd things to do.





Local medical charity, Camphill Wellbeing Trust (CWT), launched Compass in September 2020 to transform the former Waldorf School site on Craigton Road into a centre demonstrating practical solutions for healthy and sustainable lifestyles. Thanks to the support of our **local community** and over **7000 hours** donated by **712 volunteers**, our project continues to grow.

#### Have you seen us?

Following the successful public vote to **award £38,000** from the Scottish Government's Just Transition Participatory Budget to Compass in January 2023, we are delighted to announce the arrival of our **new 8-seater electric vehicle**. Complete with Compass branding, we will now be able to offer **easy access to the site** for a range of volunteers and Skills for Health [social prescribing] service users. We will also be out and about delivering weekly produce to Torry Medical Practice for residents of the local area to pick up and enjoy freshly harvested, organically grown produce - **keep an eye out and give us a wave if you see us!** 

Further progress has also been made onsite thanks to the amazing efforts of our corporate volunteer groups. Thanks to the enthusiastic attendees, we now have our first composting toilet building in situ as well as more no-dig beds, pathways and rainwater collection systems for the polytunnel. It was lovely to hear their feedback: "Really impressive facility... Aberdeen will be the better for it. Everyone was really helpful, nice and keen to share lots of gardening tips including advice on herbs to plant and I will be doing this with the kids all summer. I will definitely volunteer again with the kids in tow and spread the word."

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#### No Name Walking Group

Recently there has been a spate of articles describing how good walking for you is, although some of the more sensationalist ones use statistics which, if you're so minded, could be interpreted as suggesting you could live forever if you simply upped your number of steps per day. The original number of "10,000" steps originated as a promotional effort for an early pedometer ahead of the 1964 Tokyo Olympics; the Japanese character for 10,000 is  $\overline{D}$  which looks rather like a person walking, or can be with some artistic license, so 10,000 was adopted as the number of steps at which to aim. Of course, there is a time issue, in getting your 10,000 steps done. For the average person 2,000 steps is roughly equivalent to a mile so 10,000 steps is around 5 miles and at an average pace of 3mph 10,000 steps will take over an hour and a half.



Anyone can dig into this information on the internet.

Amongst our routes in recent months was a midsummer night's walk from the Spital\* of Dye to Mount Battock via Charr Bothy and the substantial bothy at NO 571852. We rested there till 0315 before going on to the summit to see the sun rise at 0414 BST. It's not the only place from which to greet the sun but it's much less travelled than, say, Lochnagar which disappointingly is often festooned with litter after the sunrisers have kept their vigil there. What is it about walkers, hikers, fishermen and others who can carry full cans or bottles of beer or soft drinks up a hill but can't carry the empties back down?

One of our tougher walks was also in June when three of us climbed Carn an Righ (1029m), a Munro a couple of kilometers NW of the more familiar Glas Tulaichean which in turn is some 6km NW of the Dalmunzie Hotel where one can park, for a small fee. Carn an Righ itself is an easy ascent but getting to it and back from it can be wearying. We opted to go up Gleann Taitneach and then cut through Glas Choire Bheag to the bottom of Màm nan Càrn and thence to Carn an Righ. Near the top we met up with some youngsters we'd seen earlier at their campsite by Allt Easgaidh below Srôn na Saobhaidh and had remarked on their somewhat insouciant attitude towards ticks, wearing extremely short shorts. True or not, the reports are that there are more ticks about and that more of them carry Lyme Disease which is an extremely unpleasant condition as some of our group can attest.

One of the sights in Gleann Taitneach was a Sea Eagle being harassed by another bird. Opinion is split on what the other bird was with some saying it is a Skua and other affirming it was a Curlew.

As preparation for Carn an Righ, in May we climbed Derry Cairngorm (1155m) from the Linn of Dee. A young man passed us before Derry Lodge, jogging his way up and to his credit he passed us on the way down. Running up a hill is one thing but running back down is a feat of another category;

those familiar with the upper levels of this Munro will recall that there are a lot of stones and boulders just waiting for you stick a leg in the gaps.

Last year a few of us walked the long distance path from the Old Bridge of Tilt just outside Blair Atholl to the Linn of Dee and a few of us decided to repeat the hike again this year. It's a challenging walk from the point of view of distance which is 35km, rather than ascent. (For the step counters, the writer clocked 49,040 steps.) It's a very enjoyable and satisfying trek taking one along the River Tilt in the shadow of Beinn a' Ghlo for a lot of the way and on to the White Bridge and then the Linn of Dee. One walks through Atholl Estates; the fishermen and women we met were very cheerful, and then along the border between Atholl and Fealar



Estates until one comes into Mar Lodge Estate, owned by the NTS. Land ownership in Scotland is a prickly topic but our experiences are that the estates are well disposed to us.

In August we had a very interesting walk from the Spittal of Glenmuick over to the top of Glen Lee via the Shield of Mark and the Muckle Cairn which is marked on the OS maps as Throwes House as well as Muckle Cairn. After many enquiries, the origin of the name Throwes House remains a mystery. Does anyone know? This route was one of those, "Look if there's a shielin here and a track way over there, someone must have walked between them. Trust me."

To conclude, the No Name Walking Group, aka NNWG, continues to thrive and it is hoped that this article will inspire more readers to get out and walk. If you want to join us, contact Ronnie Mitchell or Peter Richardson.

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<u>Ideas For Late Summer Colour</u> By Kerry Robinson, Plant Area Assistant at The Mains of Drum Garden Centre

What a funny old summer it's been! As I write this it's a glorious day, the sun is shining, and the air is warm. But, whatever the weather, there's still time to fill out any gaps in the garden. As the early and mid- summer plants have faded, this can leave our borders in need of a bit of oomph. Not to worry, there's plenty of options to add a splash of colour now and right through until autumn.

Echinacea come in a variety of different colours: from pink, white, and red, to yellow and orange. The lovely daisy flowers are a magnet for pollinators. Similarly, Rudbeckia work well, adding a pop of yellow, orange, or red to your garden. These work well mixed with plants such as Salvia, of which there are many different species and cultivars. These come in a vast array of different colours and forms. Some are hardier than others, but Salvia nemorosa cultivars such as S. nemorosa 'Caradonna' or 'East Friesland' are particularly good in our climate. Japanese

Anemones, Crocosmia, Helenium, Asters, Echinops, Eryngium, Sanguisorba and Verbena

bonariensis are other perennials worth including in your garden for late season interest. They like a nice sunny spot and moist but well drained soil.

Of course, for an alternative to bright showy flowers, you could always go for more colourful foliage instead. Heuchera are a brilliant plant to choose for this. With red, orange, purple, and lime green varieties there's something to suit every taste and garden! They provide some muchneeded colour towards the end of the year and retain most of their leaves through the winter. They look good planted up in containers as part of an autumnal display. And finally, it's never too early to start thinking about those spring bulbs! It might seem premature but in fact



now is the perfect time to start planning what you want to plant in Autumn to ensure you have beautiful, colourful displays next spring.

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#### **HOMEOWNERS – IMPORTANT NOTICE**

In February 2019 the Legislation relating to smoke detection in your home changed.

All domestic properties in Durris/Drumoak could be affected.

You need to have the following: -

- One smoke alarm installed in the room most frequently used for general daytime living purposes.
  - One smoke alarm in every circulation space on each storey, such as hallway and landing.
    - One heat alarm installed in every kitchen.
    - All fire alarms are to be ceiling mounted and must be interlinked.
  - Carbon monoxide detectors are to be fitted where there are carbon fuelled appliances (such as boilers, fires, open fires, heaters, stoves, or a flue).

#### The Regulations came into effect in February 2022.

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## <u>Update from Crathes Hall</u>

Oh my, where do I start?

Since the last newsletter there has been more happening at the Hall than I care to remember, or can even recall.

For those of you who have attended the Hall for a function, event or party perhaps, you will remember that it was a little "dated" and was beginning to show its age.

The walls were looking somewhat bedraggled and the whole place was "tired".

Since the decision was taken to divert from the plan to build a new Hall and refurbish the existing

one, an enormous amount of work has been undertaken by the Board of Trustees to get to a point where we were able to secure funding and the requisite trades to carry out the necessary works at the Hall.

The Hall has been closed since early July to allow IGS Services from Drumoak access to enable them to strip back both east and west internal walls so that long overdue insulation could be installed.

At the same time Wise Property Care came in to treat and replace underfloor joists that were found to be affected by



wet rot which means that nobody will now disappear through the floor at the Hogmanay Ceilidh! Whilst all this was going on round about them, the boys from SB Electrical were in laying new cables for more sockets in the hall, and replacing all the lights with modern LED equivalents that will help us reduce our electricity usage and make us even more environmentally friendly.



On top of all this chaos and mayhem, Barry Chalmers (Banchory) was busy filling old and dented walls and applying fresh paint to the entire Hall to complete the internal makeover.

The job itself was not without a few surprises! Not entirely unexpectedly we found a few areas that required some extra TLC to bring the fabric of the building up to the new "norm". This included the replacement of the joists along the entire length of the east wall and some in the wall underneath leaky "porthole" windows.

All the trades have done a monumental job to get the Hall to the point where we were able to keep a promise to a local

family to host a 40<sup>th</sup> birthday party in the Hall last Saturday night (12<sup>th</sup> Aug)


Work is still ongoing and at the time of writing we are preparing for new windows to be installed over the next couple of days before Barry comes back to begin transforming the outside of the Hall by giving that it's first coat of paint ......and hopefully second thereafter!!

Diggers have also been in to relocate flowerbeds that will let the Trustees create clean and clear walkways to and from the Hall that will ultimately let us provide some natural colour when we can get some planters back in.

Outside lighting is also being upgraded.

After all this, what is left to be done I hear you ask – not much surely!!

Once that is done, all that will be left to do is clean the mirror ball in the Hall to maximize the effect of the new spots lights (LED.....obvs!) that are being fitted for that too.

As you will see, the inside of the Hall has been transformed and we very much look forward to fully opening the doors once again.



In other news, the purchase of the 2.2 acres of the adjoining woodland at Station Wood is nearing completion with documents being exchanged to finalise the deal with The national Trust for Scotland in the week or so.

Once the Hall refurb is complete the Trustees will be sitting down to engage with the Community to see what everyone would like to see in this wonderful, wooded area.....so watch this space! None of the works, either inside or outside and any of the planned jobs could be achieved without the help and support of the Board of Trustees, some of whom have worked tirelessly to raise money, complete funding applications (not always successfully), engage with OSCR, liaise with trades and generally be there when the place needs to be cleaned, in order to get the Hall to the

position it is in now. For this effort, I and the Community extend a huge thank you as it is acknowledged that everyone gives their time freely and without compensation.


Now that we are getting to a point where we are nearly open for "routine" business, the Hall still requires the support of those attending events and functions so that we can continue to improve the facility for many years to come.



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

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
